# This week, we have been learning about long vowel sounds: $\mathbf{a}, \mathbf{e}, \mathbf{i}, \mathbf{o}$ and $\mathbf{u}$ 

## Top Tip

The vowels a, e, i, o and u can make both their letter sound or name in words. The letter sound is short while the letter name makes a long sound, for example:
' $a$ ' makes the long sound /ai/ (acorn, bacon)
'e' makes the long sound /ee/ (we, be)
'i' makes the long sound /igh/ (kind, wild)
'o' makes the long sound /oa/ (gold, hotel)
'u' makes the long sound /yoo/ (uniform, unicorn)
Sometimes you might read a word with a short vowel sound but it doesn't make sense. You can then try reading it with a long vowel sound.
