## Adding -er to words ending in y

When adding -er to words ending in y with a consonant before it, replace the y with an i.

happier funnier

## Adding **-est** to words ending in **y**

When adding  $-\mathbf{est}$  to words ending in  $\mathbf{y}$  and with a consonant before it, replace the  $\mathbf{y}$  with an  $\mathbf{i}$ .

happiest funniest

## **Common Exception Words**

We have been learning to spell the common exception words **poor** and **great**.

#### Grammar

Expanded noun phrases can be made by adding an adjective to a noun phrase, e.g.

the happy girl

my cuddly, scruffy teddy

You can also expand a noun phrase by adding information about where or when something is.

The boy on the stage was drumming.
